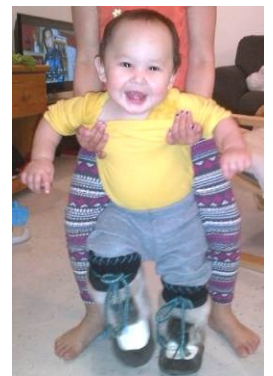

THE SELTZER-CHAN POND INLET FOUNDATION: 2015



MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS PROGRAM

The Pond Inlet Health Centre's *Mental Health & Wellness Program* initiated a women's group that met during the spring and summer to provide a supportive environment for talking about issues such as healthy relationships, substance abuse, grief and parenting. The Foundation provided funding for an instructor and supplies so that the participants could learn a skill while they talked.

Under the expert guidance of elder Rhoda Arnakallak each of the ten participants made a pair of sealskin boots. In Inuit these boots are called "kamik"; the plural is "kamiit." As well as helping to keep this traditional skill alive, the project helped local hunters since the supplies were sourced locally. The program was so successful that it will run again this fall and winter for another ten weeks.

TUNUNIQ ARSARNIIT THEATRE

A grant to the Tununig Arsarniit Theatre was used to help produce an original play called *Qallupilluk*, featuring legends, myths and the wisdom of elders. The group develops its plays and performances by consensus, involving elders as actors and writers and always weaving Inuit language and culture into every issue it tackles.

The name of the theatre includes the word *tununig* which means “the community that does not face the sun during the day.” This is an apt description for the north-facing town of Pond Inlet.

This September marks the first time that the Early Childhood Education Diploma Program of Nunavut Arctic College will be taught in Pond Inlet.
