MUSIC WORKSHOPS

Over 125 students from Ulaajuk Elementary and Nasivvik High School participated in fiddle workshops this year – the 27th and 28th workshops provided by *Tusarnaarniq Sivumut Association* (*TSA*) / *Music for the Future*. Weekly virtual lessons held throughout the year at Nasivvik High School and the in-person workshops help students build skills and confidence. Students demonstrated what they learned while entertaining family and friends in performances at the local Co-op, elementary school and community hall during the workshops.

A MENTOR IN TRAINING

Liam Milton played a special role in the music workshops this spring. Funding from the foundation allowed him to travel to Igloolik with the workshop instructors as a Youth Mentor. Working with students in Igloolik and Pond Inlet helped Liam gain in-depth teaching experience, develop leadership skills and build confidence.

Community members filled the arena with enthusiastic cheering during the four-day tournament, with the Arctic Bay Impacts winning the final match.

FUNDING EDUCATION FROM ELEMENTARY TO POST-SECONDARY

Literacy and numeracy materials purchased for the Ulaajuk Elementary School will help students practice and improve these important skills. At the high school level, the foundation provided more than \$14,000 in prizes to recognize student achievement, interest and improvement in many areas including Inuktitut, English, sports, fine arts, sewing, woodworking, attendance, citizenship and the 8 Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit Principles. Six Pond Inlet residents received grants to help them pursue post-secondary studies including University preparation courses, teacher training, health care and culinary programs.

2024 NUNAVUT JUNIOR VOLLEYBALL TOURNAMENT

Eight members of the Pond Inlet Girls Volleyball program who showed particular commitment and dedication traveled to Iqaluit for the 2024 Nunavut Territorial Junior Volleyball Tournament in April. This high level competition with 12 teams was the first time away from home for some of the young women, with all of the excitement and boost to self-confidence this type of experience can spark. Coach Natasha Simonee was very proud of all team members as they played for the first time in front of large crowds.
